Let's hope we see a bit of kinder weather in 2009. Boats are being bought and sold and it will be nice to see them being used. Mike Sidebotham has taken over the Jouet 760 "Foillan" from Phil Scott. Mike Pollard has at last found a boat that suits him - a Westerly Fulmar. Dave Batchelor has replaced his National 12 with an RS200 - this might give our IOM dinghy champions, Russell and June, something to think about. And Phil Adams now has two yachts to look after!

You will notice that there is no separate cruiser race programme. The scheduled cruiser events are in the Diary Dates. It was an uphill struggle to get people to turn out last year, so we hope a more modest offering may get some support. Mike Stanton has taken over as Cruiser Captain and will be happy to respond to an increase in demand for club racing. It will be no trouble to put on extra fun races as required. His contact details, along with everyone else, are in the programme.

The Hamblin Round Mann race should be a better do this year. We've moved it a fortnight away from the Scottish Series in the hope that more boats can attend. Robin Wootton has arranged that these race miles can be included in your 2009 Fastnet qualifiers.

We already know of quite a few travellers going offisland to race this year: Antony Ellis and Mike Wilson intend
to take their 1720 to the Scottish Series and later to the UK
Nationals on the south coast of England. Pete Barlow and Mick
Kneale are off to Portland for National 18' Championship early
August. Russell and June are taking the RS200 to Belfast for
the Irish Nationals in May and to Looe, Cornwall for the UK
Nationals in August. The Manx Yoof Sailing Squad is taking a
team to the RS Tera Nationals at Dabchicks (East coast of
England) in September. Now that the club has a new fleet of
Teras, we have every chance of getting up to speed. If there
are others, please let me know - the MYA needs an idea of
how much support may be required for dinghy travellers.

The Oppie fleet will be put up for sale. Two damaged ones were taken back to the dealer at Emsworth by club member Phil Keyes and another is already spoken for - so (at the last count) we have five available at £230 (inc.VAT) each. Ideal low-maintenance craft for your kids to get a feel for the sport.

Our experiment of moving the evening dinghy racing to Wednesdays will be closely monitored. If it turns out that we are getting less rather than more entries, we may need to have a re-think.
